KEY PILLARS OF PARENT-LED LITERACY DEVELOPMENT

Establishing a Culture of Reading:

- Daily Read-Alouds: Reading together, starting in infancy, exposes children to rich vocabulary, complex sentence structures, and the rhythm of language. This consistent routine builds comprehension and fosters a lifelong love of books.
- Modeling Behavior: Children who see their parents reading for pleasure whether a book, a newspaper, or a recipe—learn that literacy is a valuable and enjoyable life skill.

Building Foundational Language Skills (Oral Language):

- Rich Conversation: Engaging in frequent, back-and-forth conversations, using varied vocabulary, and asking open-ended questions (e.g., "Why do you think the character did that?") significantly expands a child's understanding and expressive language.
- Playing with Sound: Singing songs, reciting nursery rhymes, and playing rhyming games (like "I Spy") develop phonological awareness—the ability to hear and manipulate the sounds in words—which is crucial for learning to decode.

Developing Print and Writing Awareness:

- Pointing Out Print: Reading street signs, cereal boxes, or labels on household items helps children understand that print has meaning and that English text is read from left to right.
- Encouraging Writing: Providing materials (crayons, paper, magnetic letters) and encouraging early writing efforts—from scribbles to drawing-anddictating stories—builds fine motor skills and reinforces the connection between the spoken and written word.

By embracing these simple, consistent practices, parents don't just teach *how* to read; they instill the **motivation and confidence** that transforms a child into an active, curious, and successful learner.
